

HISTORICAL RECIPES

LUPINES: Indians ate Lupines steamed, the leaves and flowers together, and accompanied them with acorn soup. Often called wild peas, Lupines were also used to make a rheumatism tea. In 1640, John Parkinson recorded that lupine seeds would deter gnats. Mixed with meal and honey, the seeds would help heal black-and-blues. Others believed the Lupines would make an effective salve to heal the umbilical cord stub of newborns.

AUSTRIAN STEW

25 Cents worth lean breast of lamb or mutton (fat removed). Put in enough water to cover meat only. Allow to cook slowly and add:

2 onions

1 pt. tomatoes

1 or 2 green peppers (or Chili tepenia)

When nearly done add 1 Tbs lard (not butter) enough browned flour to thicken. Serve Hot. Sam Davis. Born 1850, died 1919, second editor of Appeal newspaper, Nevada.

HANK MONK FRY

6 oysters, drained well

3 slices bacon

3 eggs beaten with a little cream

Chili sauce

Fry bacon, remove. Add oysters to grease and fry slowly until edges curl. Pour eggs over top and cook slowly until eggs are firm, add bacon. Top with chili sauce.

NOTE: Hank Monk, stagecoach driver on the line between Placerville, California, and Carson City, Nevada, during the 1860's. Boom town oysters and eggs were worth their weight in gold dust. In excavations in Truckee thousands of oyster shells are found.

WINE CAKE (circa 1970, and still good)

1 pkg yellow cake mix

1 pkg vanilla instant pudding

4 eggs

1 tea. nutmeg


3/4 c. oil

3/4 c. cream sherry

On Tuesday evening, October 8, 2002, the Truckee-Donner Historical Society will present a living history program beginning at 6:30 pm at the Emigrant Trail Museum at Donner State Park.

The Society will request donation of \$3 for adults, but children under 12 are free. Light refreshments will be served.

The program will feature Fred Horlacher, in his entertaining portrayal of Moses Shallenberger, the 17-year-old emigrant member of the Stephens-Townsend-Murphy Party who survived the winter of 1844-45 alone in a makeshift cabin at what would become Donner Lake.


Shallenberger faced the same plight that would doom the Donner Party at the same spot two winters later. He had guns and lots of powder and shot, but there were no targets in the bleak whiteness surrounding him. He hunted in daylight and found books, which kept him busy at night. The boy found some steel traps,

which he baited with a few scraps of the last of his dried beef and set them in the snow.

The first night he caught a half-starved coyote and forced down the tough, gamey meat. Soon, however, he was catching foxes and other animals and their flesh got him through the worst of the winter.

This delightful program will be both fun and educational and should not be missed.
